The exhibition presents the project's five-year research engagement with the monsoon in Bangladesh, India, London and Myanmar. Using methods and techniques drawn from anthropology, history, the spatial design disciplines, the natural sciences, critical cultural theory, ecofeminism and more, the project offers methods and approaches for investigating weather, climate and more-than-human becomings in urban monsoonal worlds. 
